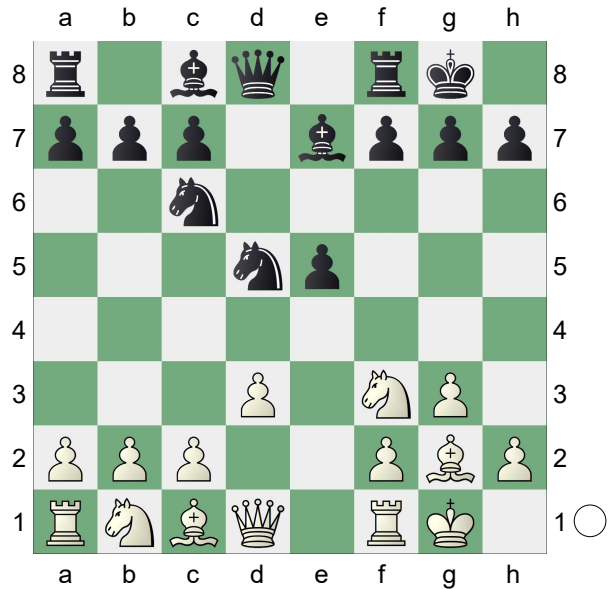

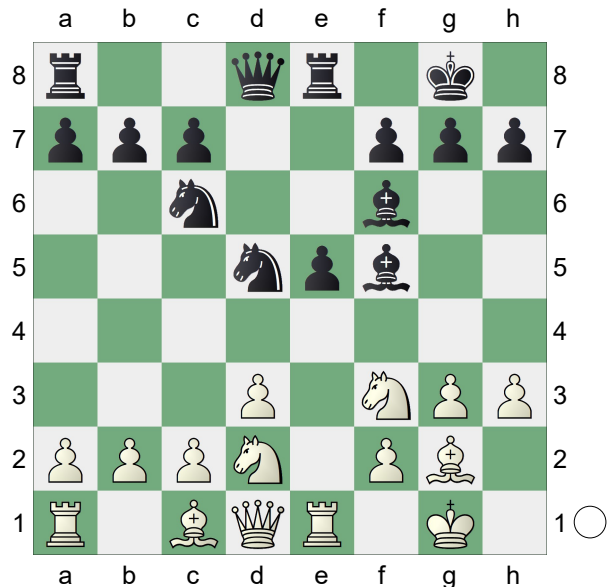

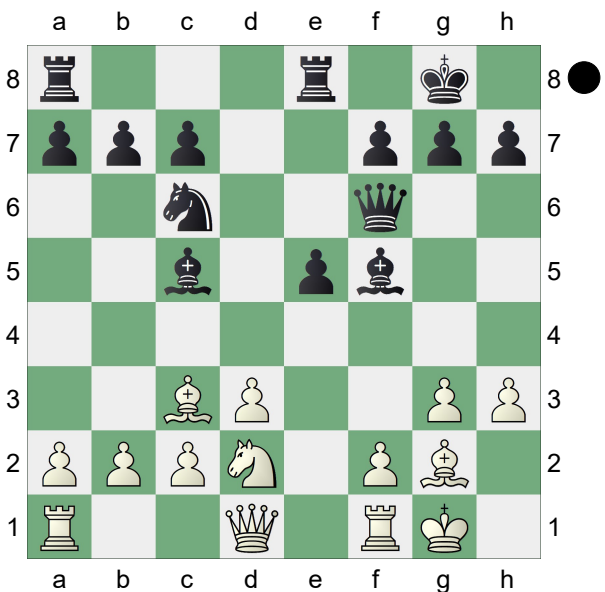

15...Bc5 White: 48 min left (he spent 22 min on his last 3 moves), Black: 51 min left (11 min on last 3 moves). This move restrains both d4 and f4, ensuring that Black keeps his space advantage. The threat was Bxf2+ and Bg4+, winning the queen, but I now see that that doesn't work, since White blocks with Bf3. White also didn't see that during the game. **16.Rf1**

[16.a3 Bxf2+? 17.Kxf2 Bg4+ 18.Bf3 Bxh3±]



16...Rad8 This was a lazy move- I forgot that White was threatening Ne4. I

should have tried Qg6 or Qh6 first. I didn't want to play Bb6, because I thought the bishop could be useful on both of its current diagonals. **17.Ne4 Qe7**

[17...Bxe4 18.Bxe4 I had to decide which bishop to give up. I saw this position and thought White would be better after Qd2/e2, Kh2, f4 with a strong attack on my kingside. Qg5 19.Kg2]

18.Kh2?! I thought White should have followed through on his idea and taken the bishop pair.

[18.Nxc5 Qxc5 19.Kh2 e4 20.Qh5 exd3 21.cxd3 This is very uncomfortable for Black, and I'm not really sure how to untangle without helping his strong bishop pair. (21.g4 Qd6+)]

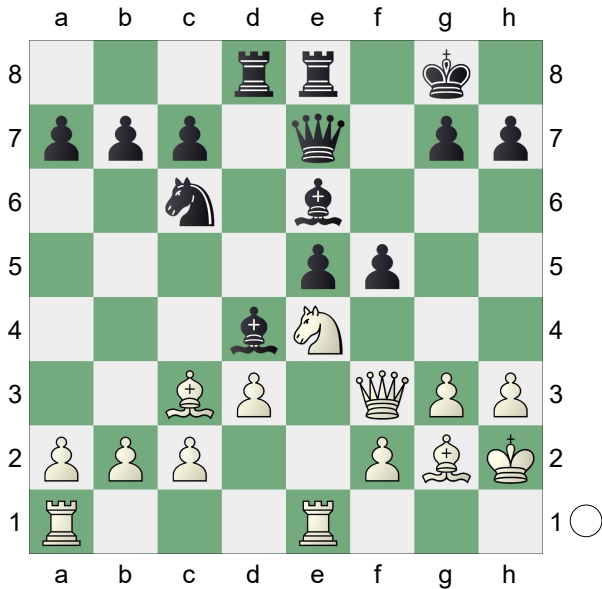
18...Bd4 19.Qf3 I don't think either side has a huge advantage, but I had the impression at this point that White was tying himself in knots. His pieces don't really seem to be working together, and Black's central control definitely looks better than when I played ...Bf8 a few moves ago. My plan was to reroute my bishop to d5, then try to play Rf8 and Rde8, then f5 if possible.

[19.Qd2]

19...Be6 20.Rfe1 f5!

I changed my mind and decided to go for ...f5 right away, since White will have much less space and his knight will be out of the game. I was convinced that Black was better at this point. White: 31 min left, Black: 30. **21.Nd2** As I said after the game (my opponent seemed to agree), White doesn't really have an active plan in this position (I overlooked Nb3). With less space and no useful



pawn breaks, I think White's long-term prospects aren't great in this position. The computer suggested doubling rooks on the e-file for White (and Black)- I don't think either of us seriously considered that. **21...Qf7**

[21...Qf6 22.Bxd4 Nxd4 23.Qxb7 Nxc2]

22.a4 I didn't understand this move at all, but White pointed out that I was attacking his a2 pawn after the game. I had no intention of taking that pawn, even if it were safe to do so- I think Black needs to be playing in the center and on the kingside in this position.

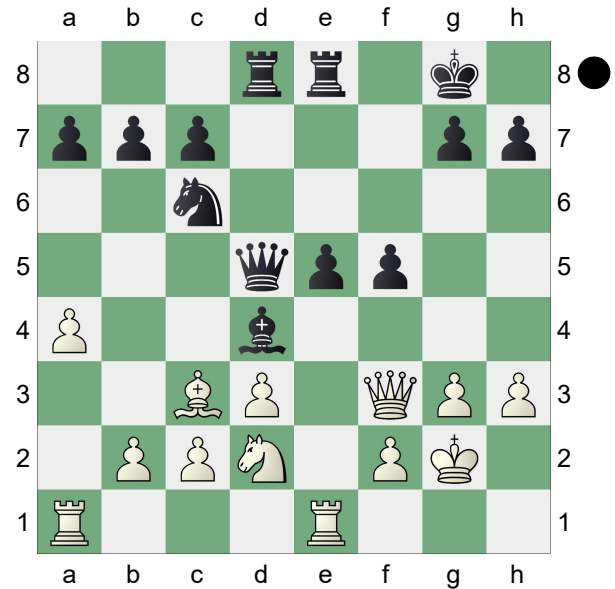

[25...e4! I looked at this and couldn't make it work in my calculations. I burned 5 of my ~25 minutes on this



move, and was now 8 minutes behind on the clock with a lot of pieces still on the board.

Somehow we both missed this line as well in our post-mortem, since we came to the conclusion that ...e4 couldn't be played. Rxf4 29.gxf4

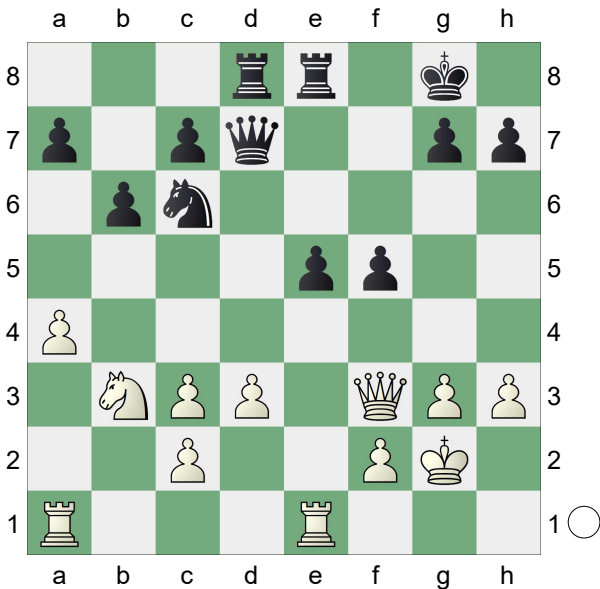

Now I don't remember if I saw this far during the game or if I assumed that the e4 pawn was lost, but I definitely didn't realize that Rf8 won the f2 pawn because of the pin on e4.]

26.Nb3! I missed this move, forcing the clarification of the situation in the center,

since I can't play Bb6 due to a5.

26...Bxc3 27.bxc3 I couldn't figure out how to exploit this pawn structure- in fact, my knight is now basically frozen. At this point I decided to offer a draw. Had White not accepted, I would probably have played Rf8, Rde8, and maybe Nd8, c5. **27...b6** Drawn on Black's offer. Both sides had 15 minutes left, but I was down 6 minutes when I offered. While I thought I had played unconvincingly in the opening, I considered my position to be better once I played ...f5, and I couldn't help thinking that I let an opportunity slip. It's hard for me to be upset about missing 25...e4- the tactics involved were simply beyond what I was capable of with my clock ticking down below 20 minutes, even though it looks a lot easier to calculate in retrospect from the comfort of my apartment.
